


Theological Thoughts with Deacon Michael

You may notice that starting this weekend the statues and images in the santuary are "veiled" with plain purple cloth.

Covering ("veiling") crosses, statues and images begins this 5th Sunday of Lent. It is an older custom that remains an option today. The origins seem to come from an medieval tradition of the "hunger cloth" which was a huge violet cloth hung in front of the altar to keep the congregation from viewing the altar. Originally, Lent was a time when public sinners were "banished" from the church and had to do public displays of penance. Over time the understanding that we all sin prevailed, Lent focused on reconciliation, and sinners were no longer restricted from the liturgy in church, but the hunger cloth gave all attending a "fast of the eyes." The cloths over time changed to smaller sizes and with more decorations, covering images in the church.

In the pre-1962 liturgical calendar, the last two weeks of Lent were called "Passiontide," a time more focused on the passion and death of Christ. The Fifth Sunday of Lent was called "Passion Sunday," and the images were covered starting this weekend. Even in the revised liturgical calendar and readings since the Second Vatican Council, these last two weeks, especially Holy Week, still continue to dwell more closely on the sufferings of Christ, but the name of Passiontide was removed. The older calendar's Passion Sunday is now combined with Palm Sunday in the current calendar, so the official title (of next Sunday) is "Palm Sunday of the Passion of Our Lord."

The rubrics in the Third Edition of the Roman Missal state: "In the Dioceses of the United States, the practice of covering crosses and images throughout the church from this Sunday may be observed. Crosses remain covered until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil." (Fifth Sunday of Lent, p. 256).

According to Monsignor Peter J. Elliott, "The custom of veiling crosses and images in these last two weeks of Lent has much to commend it in terms of religious psychology, because it helps us to concentrate on the great essentials of Christ's work of Redemption."

Even though the term "Passion Sunday" is no longer used, another remaining vestige of Passiontide is that the First Preface of the Passion is used at the beginning of the Liturgy of the Euchaist throughout the Fifth Week of Lent, no longer the other Lenten prefaces. More of the text of the Mass focuses more on the Passion from now into Holy Week.

The Triduum, the one liturgy over the three holiest days of the Church year, is near! Last Sunday, we celebrated with great *rejoicing* (Laetare!) that we had reached Lent's halfway mark, and this Sunday we have another visual that reminds us that we are only two weeks away from Easter. The covering of sacred images is a beautiful custom that can perhaps lead us to greater contemplation as we walk with Jesus through His passion, death, and resurrection. Our eyes are not drawn away to other objects and we can turn our focus to the altar, to the words of Scripture, and inward to contemplation of Christ's Passion.

"Do Your Children See You Give?

Every parent wants to raise children who share and give generously. When our children someday meet God face to face we want to know that they will hear Jesus say to them the same words the master said to those who used their talents wisely, "Well done, my good and faithful servant...Come, share your master's joy." (Matt 25:21)

However, raising a generous child is a challenge in a society that constantly teaches children to want more and more things for themselves. One of the key factors in teaching children to be generous is to let them see you giving. After all, children mimic what they **see**, *not* what they **hear**.

Today many donations to the parish Offertory may be made electronically, monthly, quarterly, or via mail. Thus, children may never actually see their parents give. A child who never sees a parent place an envelope in the Offertory could grow up thinking, "My parents never gave any support to the Church. Why should I?"

Therefore, it is important that parents talk with children about the charitable gifts the family makes. If you would like to increase your giving you might even ask your kids about ways the family budget could be adjusted so that there is more to share with God. Their suggestions might surprise you!"

Our Financial Stewardship
