LEARNING & LIVING AS DISCIPLES

What Do You Do at Adoration?

Our United States Bishops have kicked off a couple of years of "Eucharistic Revival," calling on us to refresh and renew our understanding of and appreciation for Jesus Christ, really and truly present in the Most Holy Eucharist.

One way to enter deeper into love and appreciation of the Eucharist is by spending time in Adoration. Eucharistic Adoration - spending time one-on-one, conversing from our own heart to the heart of God, in the presence of the real presence of Jesus Christ in the Most Holy Sacrament.

Often, it seems like nothing is happening during Adoration.

Many of us probably avoid it because we're not sure what to do, or we feel awkward sitting there in the quiet stillness. After all, our world surrounds us with noise, activity, and notifications from the time we wake until the time we sleep.

Sure, sometimes there is a prayer service. There might be music or incense. On Sunday evenings when we have Adoration from 7:30-8:30 p.m., we include the praying of Vespers, the Church's Evening Prayer.

Oftentimes people refer to an hour they spend with the Lord in Adoration as a "Holy Hour." You don't have to come for a whole hour. If you can make it for 15 minutes, it's worth it. Sometimes, 15 to 20 minutes is a good start if we're unaccustomed to the time in silence, pondering Our Lord. Some people like to make what they call a "Holy Half Hour". Make it when you can, and make it work for you! Stop by on the way to or from work. Bring the kids to talk with Jesus with you.

At the heart of it all is a golden monstrance holding a simple, still Host.

The lack of anything "happening" can make us uncomfortable. By the eyes of faith, we can see this silent and still presence as the Lord Himself. But *he* isn't doing anything - so should *we*?

It's like going out for dinner with an old friend, but they don't say anything. They just sit there across the table staring at us. Awkward, right?

What are we supposed to *do* at Eucharic Adoration?

If we're not careful, trying to busy ourselves ends up disrupting the opportunity to just be present and adore the Lord. Asking what to do is a reminder of our attachment to the world.

The simple answer is that the Lord's presence is part of his gift to us. He could appear in the flames of a burning bush, in the winds of a storm, or the waves of the ocean. But He chooses to

be present in a simple, humble way, in the unassuming form of a Host made of unleavened bread.

He calls us to come before him humbly, to be still and silent, to wait and rest. To just *be* with Him.

Then, as friends, we can talk to each other, heart to heart. It's in these quiet, peaceful, still moments of Adoration that God can help us break through the clutter and noise of daily life. We discern His will for

us and come to more deeply understand Him speaking of His love for us.

His patience is at work in these moments. It's His stability, constancy, and fidelity to being with us that we encounter in the Blessed Sacrament. This is the gift.

Rather than worrying so much about how to see the Lord or *what to do* in His presence, He calls us to *just be seen* by Him and let Him speak to our heart.

The invitation to be with Our Lord in Adoration calls for us to reverse the inclination that our first parents felt in the Garden after the first sin, trying to avoid and hide from God. His gaze is not always comforting, but it is always true. And it will help us see our true selves, as He sees us and wants to see us.



When Can I Come to Adoration?

Adoration is available at St. Elizabeth every Thursday from 9 a.m. (after the 8:15 a.m. Mass) until Benediction at 9 p.m.

It's also available on Sundays from 7:30-8:30 p.m. On Sundays we also pray the Church's Evening Prayer (Vespers).

Benediction is a special Blessing that an ordained priest or deacon can extend by making the sign of the cross with the monstrance (the device holding the Host during adoration) over the assembled faithful.

The Blessing doesn't come from the minister - it comes directly from Jesus Christ Himself, present in the Eucharistic Host. It's a most special blessing available at the end of most periods of Adoration.

What Should I Bring to Adoration?

You don't have to bring anything. You could bring a friend. We're actually hoping that some of our parish organizations accept the challenge of "Adopting" a Sunday evening each month when they join us for Holy Hour with Vespers. That's a way to bring a lot of friends!

Some people like to bring a prayer book or their Bible. Opening the Scriptures and letting God speak to you through His written Word while in the presence of the Living Word can be powerful.

Some people like to bring a Rosary or another favorite devotional. The most important thing to bring is a humble, listening heart, waiting to hear Jesus speak with them.

SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office or Deacon Michael. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact Father Alfred or Deacon Michael at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact Deacon Michael via the Parish Office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
