# **Entering Passiontide - Why is the Cross Covered?**

Covering, or "vieiling," the crosses, statues and images with violet cloth begins with the Fifth Sunday of Lent. It is an older custom that remains to today.

Originally, Lent was a season when public sinners were cast out from the church and had to make public displays of penance. As the understanding that we are all sinners became the norm and "known" sinners were no longer kept from the Lenten liturgies, a new tradition developed. In medieval times, a "hunger cloth," a huge violet cloth, hung in front of the altar to keep the faithful from seeing the altar. The hunger cloth gave all of the laity a "fast of the eyes."

The covering of images came later, perhaps continuing the idea of fasting the eyes.

In the 1962 liturgical calendar and prior. Lent was somewhat divided. The last two weeks were considered "Passiontide." a time to turn the attention from our Lord's forty day fast and journey in the desert to His passion and death. In these older calendars, the Fifth Sunday of Lent was called "Passion Sunday" and is when the images in the church were covered.

Even in the revised liturgy, these last two weeks continue to dwell more closely on the sufferings of Christ, but the name of Passiontide was removed. The older cal-



endar's Passion Sunday is now combined with Palm Sunday in the current calendar, so the official title is "Palm Sunday of the Passion of Our Lord." That is what we will celebrate next Sunday.

Still, the covering of sacred images is a tradition that can be retained. The rubrics in the third edition of the Roman Missal state: "In the Dioceses of the United States, the practice of covering crosses and images throughout the church from this Sunday may be observed. Crosses remain covered until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil."

Although the terms "Passion Sunday" and "Passiontide" are no longer used, there is still another remaining sign one might note in the liturgies the next two weeks: The Prefaces for the Eucharistic Prayer cahange from the Prefaces for Lent to the Prefaces for the Passion.

The cloths that cover the images are plain fabric with no decoration. Before the vigil Mass or Evening Prayer I of the Fifth Sunday of Lent all statues and images except the Stations of the Cross and stained-glass windows are veiled. Older liturgical books reference papal permission in 1878 to keep St. Joseph uncovered in March since it is his feast month. The coverings are removed without any ceremony before the Easter Vigil begins.

The Triduum is near! Last Sunday, Laetare Sunday, we saw rose vestments and we rejoiced at the halfway point of Lent, and this Sunday we have a visual reminder that we are just two weeks from Easter. Hopefully the covering of images helps lead us to greater contemplation as we walk with Jesus through His passion, death, and resurrection.

# This Sunday: Fifth Sunday of Lent Ez 37:12-14; Rom 8:8-11; Jn 11:1-45

In the first reading, Ezekiel prophesies that God will raise his people from their graves. In his Letter to the Romans, Paul promises that those who live in the Spirit will receive life through the Spirit. In the Gospel, Jesus raises his friend Lazarus from the dead, and many people come to believe in him.

# Next Sunday: Palm Sunday

Mt 21:1-11; Is 50:4-7; Phil 2:6-11; Mt 26:14-27:66 In the introductory reading from Matthew's Gospel, Jesus enters Jerusalem. The prophet Isaiah speaks as the suffering servant who has trusted in the Lord while submitting to persecution. In the second reading, Paul speaks of Jesus' total self-gift and God's subsequent exaltation of Jesus. In the Gospel, we hear of Judas' betrayal, the Passover supper Jesus shared with his disciples and, finally, Jesus' death on the cross.

# **Praying the Divine Mercy Novena**



We offer the Divine Mercy Novena by praying the Divine Mercy Chapel together daily starting after the Liturgy of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, for the nine days concluding on Divine Mercy Sunday.

The Divine Mercy Chaplet is traditionally prayed at, or as close as possible to, 3 p.m., the hour of our Lord's death upon the cross.

Join us in the church every day during the novena for the Divine Mercy Chaplet, but especially on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 16.

From The Divine Mercy.org:

The message of The Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us – all of us. And, He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share His joy.

The Divine Mercy message is one we can call to mind simply by remembering ABC:

A - Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His mercy out upon us and upon the whole world.

B - Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us.

C - Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that all the graces of His mercy can only be received by our trust. The more we open the door of our hearts and lives to Him with trust, the more we can receive.

This message and devotion to Jesus as The Divine Mercy is based on the writings of Saint Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread.

The message and devotional practices proposed in the Diary of Saint Faustina and set forth in this web site and other publications of the Marians of the Immaculate Conception are completely in accordance with the teachings of Church and are firmly rooted in the Gospel message of our Merciful Savior. Properly understood and implemented, they will help us grow as genuine followers of Christ.

Spend time to learn more about the mercy of God, learn to trust in Jesus, and live your life as merciful to others, as Christ is merciful to you.

# **Good Friday Fast Reminder**

Those ages 18-59, in reasonable health, are required to fast on Good Friday. Those 14 and older must abstain from meat. Children, adults with physical and mental illness, pregnant women and those nursing are all exempt. The USCCB stresses that "common sense should prevail" and that no one should jeopardize their health to fast. Canon Law does mention that for young children not fasting, parents should still communicate the meaning and penance.

Lent ends at the beginning of the Triduum (Evening Mass on Holy Thursday), but Lenten fasting and personal commitments usually continue until Easter. Papal document *Paschalis Solemnitatis* recommends this in order that we "with uplifted and welcoming heart be ready to celebrate the joys of the Sunday of the resurrection."

# **SACRAMENTS**

Reconciliation: If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office or Deacon Michael. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact Father Alfred or Deacon Michael at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact Deacon Michael via the Parish Office.

# PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
