Holy Week & The Triduum: The Holiest Days of the Church Year

At the heart of our Christian faith is the fact that God sent his Son, born as a man Jesus Christ, to undergo his passion and death and to rise from the dead, to atone for our sins and to open for us the gates of eternal life. That is what we celebrate every Sunday, but most especially this week of the Church year.

The summit of the whole Church year is the Easter Triduum, from the evening Mass of Holy Thursday through Eventing Prayer of Easter Sunday. In three days, it is liturgically one event unfolding Christ's Paschal Mystery.

Lent ends and the Triduum begins at the start of the Mass on the evening of Holy Thursday and ends with Evening Prayer II (Vespers) on Easter Sunday night.

Mass begins as usual on Holy Thursday with an Entrance Antiphon. But it doesn't end on Holy Thursday. Rather than a

blessing and dismissal, the liturgy continues with a Solemn Procession, taking the remaining Blessed Sacrament to a place of repose. We are invited to come for quiet prayer and adoration until Midnight, recalling and entering into Jesus' prayer in his Agony in the Garden.

Good Friday of the Lord's Passion is the only day during the Church year on which there is liturgy but no Mass. The Triddum continues with a solemn entrance in silence, in which ordained ministers fall prostrate upon the floor at the hour our Lord died on the cross. The proclamation of the Passion from the Gospel of John, veneration of the cross, and reception of the Eucharist remaining from Holy Thursday are part of this portion of the Triduum.

The Triduum continues with the Vigil in the Holy Night of Easter. We bless the Paschal Candle for the year, proclaim

Scriptures recalling all of salvation history, proclaim Jesus's Resurrection, and welcome new Catholics with the Sacraments of Initiation.

The Triduum continues for one more day. through the remaining Masses of Easter Sunday morning in which we continue the celebration of Jesus' Resurrection, and through Vespers (Evening Prayer) of Easter Sunday.

The Easter season continues for fifty days until Pentecost. These are days of heightened ongoing celebration of the single most important things that have happened in human history.

It's tempting to end this column with the "A word" that we've avoided all Lent but will get to sing again at the Easter Vigil, but it's not time yet. In the meantime, praise to Jesus Christ, King of endless Glory!

This Sunday: Palm Sunday

Mt 21:1-11; Is 50:4-7; Phil 2:6-11; Mt 26:14-27:66 In the introductory reading from Matthew's Gospel, Jesus enters Jerusalem. The prophet Isaiah speaks as the suffering servant who has trusted in the Lord while submitting to persecution. In the second reading, Paul speaks of Jesus' total self-gift and God's subsequent exaltation of Jesus. In the Gospel, we hear of Judas' betrayal, the Passover supper Jesus shared with his disciples and, finally, Jesus' death on the cross.

Next Sunday: Easter Sunday

Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Col 3:1-4; Jn 20:1-9 Peter summarizes the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, and his commissioning of the Apostles. The second reading urges the Colossians to concentrate on heavenly, not earthly, things. In the Gospel, the women find the empty tomb and tell the disciples. Peter and the beloved disciple run to the tomb and find the burial cloths.

14 DAY SANCTUARY LAMP

Good Friday Fast Reminder

Those ages 18-59, in reasonable health, are required to fast on Good Friday. Those 14 and older must abstain from meat. Children, adults with physical and mental illness, pregnant women and those nursing are all exempt. The USCCB stresses that "common sense should prevail" and that no one should jeopardize their health to fast. Canon Law does mention that for young children not fasting, parents should still communicate the meaning and penance.

Lent ends at the beginning of the Triduum (Evening Mass on Holy Thursday), but Lenten fasting and personal commitments usually continue until Easter. Papal document *Paschalis Solemnitatis* recommends this in order that we "with uplifted and welcoming heart be ready to celebrate the joys of the Sunday of the resurrection."

We look forward to the liturgical celebrations of Holy Week, through which the Lord draws us more fully into the mystery of His death and resurrection.

The Divine Mercy Novena

In 1935, St. Faustina received a vision of an angel sent by God to chastise a certain city. She began to pray for mercy, but her prayers were powerless. Suddenly she saw the Holy Trinity and felt the power of Jesus' grace within her. At the same time she found herself pleading with God for mercy with words she heard interiorly:



Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world; for the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us. (Diary, 475)

As she continued saying this inspired prayer, the angel became helpless and could not carry out the deserved punishment (see 474). The next day, as she was entering the chapel, she again heard this interior voice, instructing her how to recite the prayer that our Lord later called "the Chaplet." This time, after "have mercy on us" were added the words "and on the whole world" (476).

Pope St. John Paul II established the 2nd Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday. The Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday and continues until the Sunday after Easter.

For those making the nine-day novena, you may say it privately wherever you are, or attend the prayer with us daily at 3:00 p.m. in the church. The novena begins on Good Friday and ends at the closing on Divine Mercy Sunday.

The closing will be held at St. Elizabeth Church on Sunday, April 24, from 2-3:30 p.m. Confessions and Adoration will be available during the Holy Hour from 2-3. The blessing and veneration of the image will conclude with the Divine Mercy Chaplet and Benediction starting at 3:00 p.m. All are welcome to attend.

"At three o'clock implore My mercy especially for sinners; and if only for a brief moment immerse yourself in My Passion, particularly in My abandonment at the moment of agony. This is the Hour of Great Mercy for the whole world. In this hour, I will refuse nothing to the soul that makes a request of Me in virtue of My Passion." – St. Faustina's Diary, 1320.

SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office or Deacon Michael. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact Father Alfred or Deacon Michael at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact Deacon Michael via the Parish Office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
