In the first reading, Eliakim is given the tokens of the master of the palace and the Lord gives him authority over the palace to be a father to all Jerusalem. Saint Paul writes to the Romans that God's knowledge and wisdom are unfathomable. In the Gospel, when Jesus asks who the crowds say he is, the disciples give varied answers. Peter answers correctly and Jesus gives him the keys of the kingdom.

Next Sunday: 22nd Sunday in Ord. Time Jer 20:7-9; Rom 12:1-2; Mt 16:21-27

In the first reading, Jeremiah bemoans the suffering he endures because of his faithfulness to the word of the Lord. What is a Bishop?

A bishop is a man who possesses the fullness of the Sacrament of Holy Orders and the priesthood of Jesus Christ, the chief among the three orders in service of the Church (bishop, priest, and deacon). The bishop is ordained to the fullness of the priesthood in order to govern and to teach a diocese, a geographic portion of the faithful, as its chief pastor. Bishops are the successors of the Apostles. A bishop's responsibilities include:


To Teach: A bishop is the principal teacher in his diocese and has the responsibility to preach the Word of God and the truths of the faith to his people. He must ensure that those delegated to teach in his name, namely priests, deacons, teachers, catechists and others, teach the truth.

To Govern: A bishop is responsible for meeting the needs of the local community (material, social, personal and spiritual) as well as ensuring that Church laws are observed. He is ultimately responsible for training and supplying clergy for parishes, for the finances of the diocese, and for all church property. A bishop has the power to make Church laws, to be a judge in Church matters, and to enforce observance of these laws. These laws generally relate to worship, preaching, administration of the sacraments, safeguarding the faith and morals of the faithful, and religious instruction.

To Sanctify: A bishop is responsible for ensuring that the sacraments are administered and has the special authority to ordain priests and deacons, and to confirm the faithful. He must ensure that Mass is celebrated in the diocese every Sunday and on major feast days.

What symbols are associated with the Bishop?

Crozier: The shepherd's staff which symbolizes being the shepherd of the people in the diocese.



Pectoral Cross: The large ornamental cross worn as a necklace.

Ring: A ring worn on the third finger of the right hand. Some people kiss the bishop's hand or ring as a sign of their love for him and the recognition that he is a living icon of Christ in the midst of the Church.

Zucchetto: Bishops wear a purple zucchetto on their head while cardinals wear red and the Pope wears white.

Coat of Arms: A bishop chooses symbols appropriate to himself and his diocese. The arms of the diocese may occupy the left side while his personal arms occupy the right.

Motto: A set of meaningful words, often written in the official language of the Catholic Church, Latin. Bishop Paprocki's

ABOUT BISHOP PAPROCKI

Bishop Thomas John Paprocki is the ninth Bishop of the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois (installed on June 22, 2010). Growing up in Chicago, he was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of Chicago in 1978. After ordination, he studied law at DePaul University College of Law and was admitted to the Illinois Bar in 1981. Working as a parish priest at St. Michael Church in South Chicago, a neighborhood with high unemploy-



ment due to shutdowns of the local steel mills, then-Father Paprocki co-founded the South Chicago Legal Clinic to help answer the need for legal services for the poor. In 2014 Bishop Paprocki was named President Emeritus and Of Counsel of the organization, now called the Greater Chicago Legal Clinic.

In November, 1985, Cardinal Joseph Bernardin appointed Fr. Paprocki Vice-Chancellor of the Archdiocese of Chicago and in 1987 sent him to do post-graduate studies in canon law at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome. He completed his doctoral degree in 1991. Father Paprocki then returned to his previous position in Chicago as Vice-Chancellor and was appointed Chancellor in March, 1992, serving in that capacity under Cardinal Bernardin and then under Cardinal Francis George, following Cardinal Bernardin's death in 1996.

Concluding his service as Chancellor after two terms in office in June, 2000, Father Paprocki studied Polish language and culture at the Jagiellonian University in Kraków, Poland. In January 2001, he was appointed Pastor of St. Constance Parish, serving primarily a large immigrant community from Poland on the northwest side of Chicago. Pope John Paul II appointed him to serve as Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago on January 24, 2003. Cardinal George named him Liaison for Health and Hospital Affairs in the Archdiocese of Chicago. In May 2013, he received his Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.) degree from the University of Notre Dame. He taught as an Adjunct Professor of Law at Loyola University's Chicago School of Law from 1999 to 2015. He also taught at Notre Dame Law School from 2016-2021. He is currently an Adjunct Professor of Law, Business, and Bioethics at Quincy University's Oakley School of Business. Bishop Paprocki also serves on the Illinois Catholic Health Association Board and serves as the chairman of the Committee on Canonical Affairs and Church Governance for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

In addition to English, he speaks Polish, Spanish and Italian, and he reads Latin. Bishop Paprocki's hobbies are reading, running, and playing hockey. He has run 24 marathons: Chicago (1995, 1996, 1997, 1998, 1999, 2002 and 2005), Columbus, Ohio (1998), Boston (1998), Rome (2000) Athens (2000), Washington, D.C. (2004 & 2007), Dayton, Ohio (2006), Dublin, Ireland (2008), Minneapolis-St. Paul (2009), Denver (2010), Kansas City (2011), St. Louis (2012), Springfield (2013 and 2015), Philadelphia (2016), Indianapolis (2017), Long Beach, CA (2018), and in the process raising more than \$500,000 for charity. He has made the connection between sports and faith a focus of his ministry. In this regard, he serves as the Chairman of the Episcopal Advisory Board of Catholic Athletes for Christ. His first book, Holy Goals for Body and Soul: Eight Steps to Connect Sports with God and Faith, was published by Ave Maria Press (Notre Dame, Indiana), in 2013. His second book, Running for a Higher Purpose: Eight Steps to Spiritual and Physical Fitness, released in 2021, was also published by Ave Maria Press.

CELEBRATING SUNDAYS FOR CATHOLIC FAMILIES

HEARING THE WORD: Read Matthew 16:15-18

REFLECTING ON THE WORD

Today, we hear Jesus ask the ultimate question: Who do you say that I am? He asked his disciples, and he is asking us as well. He wants to know who you say that he is. Not your priest, not your parents, not your friends, but you. Your authentic response can change your life. Peter doubted while walking on water, he denied Jesus in his time of need, and he was not educated in the temple. But notice that his response to who he believed Jesus was, what he truly believed in his heart about him, led Jesus to choose him to be the head of the Church. I wonder what Jesus could do with your answer.

ON THE WAY TO MASS

How would you answer Jesus' question: Who do you say that I am?

ON THE WAY HOME FROM MASS

I wonder how Simon Peter felt when Jesus said, "Blessed are you... Upon this rock I will build my church." I wonder if he fully understood what Jesus was asking of him.

LIVING THE WORD

It is hard to answer Jesus' question with just one word. Simon Peter even had two different names for Jesus in his answer in today's Gospel. Write down everyone's answer to the question "Who do you say that Jesus is?" Look at the variety of ways Jesus reveals himself to us.

WEEKLY STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION


"Or who has given the Lord anything that he may be repaid?" - Romans 11:35

SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
