Dear Father Alfred,

Special thanks to you and to every member of Saint Elizabeth parish after my recent visit to your church and school. I was happy to join you for all of the weekend's events and liturgies and was impressed throughout by the generosity and faithfulness of all those that I had the chance to meet. It was a joy to participate in each of the Masses and to see everyone involved in welcoming people, preparing, serving, singing, or lectoring for those liturgies. I was not able to personally thank everyone who worked hard to extend their hospitality to us (and not just to us!), but I hope to express my gratitude to everyone with this letter.

Saturday evening, I had the chance to tour your school and offices, as well as join many of your staff and council members for evening prayer and dinner. Many of these leaders also gave of their time Sunday afternoon to talk about everything happening around Saint Elizabeth parish and to express their thoughts and hopes for your future efforts to live and proclaim the Gospel around Granite City. I'm afraid this letter will also be inadequate to recount the full extent of our conversation, but I want to highlight a few things that truly inspired and encouraged me. I hope to urge all of you to follow Our Lord and seek to complete the mission He has entrusted to you, and to Saint Elizabeth parish.

BISHOP PAPROCKI'S HOMILY FROM LAST WEEKEND

Homily for Parish Pastoral Visit St. Elizabeth Church, Granite City, Illinois 21st Sunday of Ordinary Time – Year A

August 26-27, 2023

† Most Reverend Thomas John Paprocki

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

It is good to be with you for this pastoral visit to Saint Elizabeth Parish in Granite City. After celebrating Masses and delivering the homily at the Masses yesterday and this morning, I will meet with your parish councils to hear about all the good things that are happening here at your parish to implement our Fourth Diocesan Synod.

My visit this weekend is also an opportunity to share with you my hopes and my vision as your bishop for the future of our diocese, building on and implementing our Diocesan Synod held in 2017 on the theme of discipleship and stewardship.

Following our Diocesan Synod, I published my third pastoral letter, **Ars vivendi et moriendi in Dei gratia**, Latin for, "The Art of Living and Dying in God's Grace," the full text of which is posted on our diocesan website. In this letter, I provide a summary of the Fourth Diocesan Synod and some pastoral commentary on the twelve declarations that were adopted.

I also offered some theological reflections on the art of living and dying in God's grace.

In my previous pastoral letter, called, **Ars crescendi in Dei Gratia**, Latin for, "The Art of Growing in God's Grace," I wrote, "The art of growing in God's grace is the key to growth in the Church. Building a culture of growth in the Church starts with inviting people to experience the love of Jesus Christ." I also proposed some constructive steps to build a culture of growth in the Church. These steps for growth were designed to build on the foundation that I laid in my first pastoral letter, Ars celebrandi et adorandi, "The Art of Celebrating the Liturgy Properly and Adoring the Lord in the Eucharist Devoutly."

In my third pastoral letter, I said that the "art of living and dying in God's grace is the key to everlasting happiness in eternal life. The Christian faithful die to sin through the saving waters of baptism. By dying to their selfish desires through acts of mortification and self-sacrifice, the Christian faithful grow in love of God and neighbor. The whole Christian life aims at reaching this goal of everlasting happiness in eternal life by turning from sin and growing in virtue through God's grace.

As an expression of how to reach this goal of everlasting happiness, we adopted a new mission statement at our Fourth Diocesan Synod for all of us as members of this Diocese. It says, "The mission of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Springfield in Illinois is to build a fervent community of intentional and dedicated missionary disciples of the Risen Lord and stead-fast stewards of God's creation who seek to become saints. Accordingly, the community of Catholic faithful in this diocese is committed to the discipleship and stewardship way of life as commanded by Christ Our Savior and as revealed by Sacred Scripture and Tradition."

To further this mission, the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois is committed to implementing the Four Pillars of Discipleship and Stewardship, namely, hospitality, prayer, formation and service. In other words, we will invite people proactively to join us in prayer, especially Sunday Mass; we will provide well-prepared celebrations of the sacraments and other occasions for prayer as signs of hope and paths of grace to heaven; we will study the Bible and learn more about Jesus and our Catholic faith; and we will serve each other, especially those in need, by practicing charity and justice.

Through prayer, discernment, and consultation with others, it has become evident that the Lord is inviting us to embrace more fully our call to discipleship out of which necessarily follows a life of stewardship.¹

My brothers and sisters in Christ: In today's Gospel passage (Matthew 16:13-20), when Jesus asks the disciples the general question as to what people are saying about Him, the disciples select the celebrities from their tradition: Elijah, John the Baptist, or Jeremiah the prophet, all of whom are known as announcers of a new age. When Jesus makes the question more personal and asks, "But who do you say that I am?", it is Peter who makes the leap of faith and declares Him to be "the Christ, the Son of the living God." Peter's response lays the foundation for building the Body of Christ in this world. Jesus calls Peter "the rock" upon which He will build His Church, providing the means for all disciples to spread the Good News of God's love and salvation throughout the world.

All of us are asked to answer the question Jesus poses: "Who do you say that I am?" Because he is both God and man, Jesus is both human and divine in his relationship to us. Thus, He may be friend, confidant, teacher, redeemer, and founder of the Catholic Church, the Body of Christ on earth. Most importantly, He is our Lord and Savior.

BISHOP PAPROCKI'S HOMILY FROM LAST WEEKEND

I concluded my third pastoral letter by telling a personal anecdote, which I would like to share with you now to close this homily.

Once when I was catching a flight to concelebrate an out-of-town wedding for a friend of mine, I had gift-wrapped a figurine of the Blessed Mother as a wedding present for the newlyweds and put the gift in my carry-on bag. When I got to the airport and put my bag on the conveyer belt for security screening, the TSA agent looked at the x-ray of my bag and called out, "Bag check." I immediately realized the problem: the figurine was made of leaded crystal and the security agent must have thought it was some sort of weapon. The TSA supervisor came over, saw me standing there wearing my clerical suit and Roman collar, then looked at the x-ray image of the figurine and exclaimed, "For heaven's sake, it's the Blessed Mother, let him through!" Of course, I was greatly relieved, and while the incident still makes me laugh, I have often thought that this little vignette is exactly the scenario I hope for when I die: I pray that I will arrive at the gates of heaven with the Blessed Mother at my side. Seeing me standing there with Our Lady beside me, Saint Peter will exclaim, "For heaven's sake, he's with the Blessed Mother, let him through!"

Staying close to our Blessed Mother throughout life provides faithful assurance that she will lead us to her Son Jesus at the hour of our death, so that we may die in God's grace and enjoy everlasting happiness in eternal life.

May God give us this grace. Amen.



Next Sunday: 23rd Sunday in Ord. Time Ez 33:7-9; Rom 13:8-10; Mt 18:15-20 Ezekiel, in today's first reading, is appointed watchman to guide his people in the ways of the Lord. In the second reading, Paul describes to the Roman Church how love fulfills the entire law and satisfies every commandment. The Gospel includes Jesus' instructions for navigating conflict and correcting those who sin. He concludes by saying that he is present when people gather in his name for prayer.

What's Holding You Back? Join us in Springfield.


A special day to come together to celebrate our faith and the Eucharist is happening **Saturday, October 28 at the BOS Center in Springfield**.

It includes the Gospel, a reflection, a question to ponder before AND after Mass as well as a section called Living the Word to consider how you can take the Gospel with you for the rest of the week. HEARING THE WORD: Read Matthew 16:21-25: Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer greatly from the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed and on the third day be raised. Then Peter took Jesus aside and began to rebuke him, "God forbid, Lord! No such thing shall ever happen to you." He turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it."

REFLECTING ON THE WORD

Jesus never said following him was going to be easy. He said he is the only source of complete joy, he will give us eternal life in heaven, but he never promises that our lives would have no burdens. Jesus tells us we must "take up our cross and follow him." Follow him where? Well, where did he go? To be crucified. But the story doesn't end on Good Friday. We follow him all the way to Easter Sunday. Jesus promises that his light will always be stronger than the darkness. But to get to that light, we must follow him.





SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
