St. Elizabeth welcomed Bishop Thomas John Paprocki to our campus a few weeks ago. We were honored for him to take some extra time before mass to be interviewed by us.

Q: How many churches have you visited and which one have you visited the most?

A: That's a tough question, because I've visited many churches. We have 129 parishes in our diocese, and I have to visit them all. But the one I visited the most is our Cathedral in Springfield.

Q: What inspired you to be a bishop?

A: My parents inspired me, I am the third of 9 in my family. When I was younger, me and my siblings played mass, and from age 4 I wanted to be a priest. Then, I was a priest in Chicago, and was appointed Bishop by the Pope.

Q: What do you do in your free time? A: I like to read religious, biography, and history books. I like to read about Abe Lincoln and George Washington. I also like to run and play hockey.

Q: What is the #1 Rule of being a bishop? A: The bishop is the shepherd (the reason why he carries the staff) My job is supposed to keep everyone together, because the people represent the sheep.

Q: What is your favorite part about St. Elizabeth Parish? A: The decorations in the classrooms and outside of it. In public schools you don't see it there. The verses and scriptures that are hung up in and out of the classrooms, I love it.

About the Invest in Kids Act

Empower Illinois is a Scholarship Granting Organization that administers the tax credit scholarship program. Here is information from their website <u>https://empowerillinois.org/engage/policy/</u>

Empower Illinois believes every student, regardless of their race, income, academic ability, or ZIP Code deserves access to a quality education. But for too many children who live near poverty or for students with certain special needs, those opportunities are out of reach.

In 2017, Empower Illinois worked alongside a broad and diverse coalition to pass the <u>Invest in Kids Act</u>, a \$100 million tax credit scholarship program, to answer the call of so many for quality educational options. This represented the first private school choice program in Illinois.

The Illinois Tax Credit Scholarship program provides K-12 scholarships for students in low-income and working-class families to attend a qualified private school in Illinois through a scholarship provided by private donor dollars.

Private donors may give up to \$1.33 million to the qualifying Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO), such as Empower Illinois, to provide scholarships. Donors are then eligible to receive a 75 percent (\$1 million cap) state tax credit on the donation to be used against the individual or corporation's state and local tax liability.

Different from many existing tax credit scholarship programs around the country, donors may designate their donations to specific schools or school systems. At this time, corporations can donate, but may not designate their donation.

As a result of donations, <u>qualifying students</u> may apply and receive scholarships worth up to 100 percent of required tuition at a private school of their choice. Higher scholarships are available for specific populations of students, including; English language learners (ELL), students with individualized education plans (IEPs), and academically gifted students.

Priesthood Sunday is a special day set aside to honor priesthood in the United States. It is a day to reflect upon and affirm the role of the priesthood in the life of the Church as a central one. This nationwide event is coordinated and sponsored by the US Council of Serra International. It is celebrated on the last Sunday of September.

Catholics are invited to observe Vatican-backed worldwide events, namely, World Day of Prayer for Vocations and World Day for Consecrated Life. In the United States, we also have National Vocation Awareness Week and National Catholic Sisters Week. Priesthood Sunday, however, specifically honors priests, without whom the Mass could not be offered and Sacraments could not be celebrated. Priesthood Sunday is a chance to thank and honor priests in unique ways.

It is essential to note that the number of priests and ordinations in the United States has steadily declined in the past 50 years. Meanwhile, the number of parishes without a resident priest pastor has sharply increased in the same period of time. The men who answer the call to priesthood are special indeed, and they are working harder than ever before.

"The priesthood is the love of the heart of Jesus. When you see a priest, think of our Lord Jesus Christ." - St. John Vianney, patron saint of parish priests!



SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.


Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
