## Celebrating Sister Stephanie & Her Vocation

This week, we celebrate National Vocation Awareness Week. It is dedicated to promoting vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated religious life through prayer and education.

Typically when we talk about vocations it is in the context of our priests. We are blessed to have in our midst our beloved Sister Stephanie Turck, CDP. Sister Stephanie recently celebrated the 60th anniversary of her joining her religious community, Congregation of Divine Providence. Their mission: to make God's Love Visible In the World. Anyone that knows Sister Stephanie quickly realizes that she embodies this motto with her daily life. She sat down to discuss her vocational path and shared the photos featured here.

As a young girl she went to Sacred Heart School, but moved to Pine Street. She wanted to finish at Sacred Heart because she loved the Dominican sisters there, her other siblings going to St. Elizabeth. Sister Stephanie was about to register for her next 3 years at Coolidge and recalls her dad asking her if she had ever thought about going to the convent. She was surprised because while her brother Bob had regularly talked about the priesthood, their mother was not open to her going to the convent. She told her dad that she was

definitely interested, but concerned about how her mother would react. Her father assured her that if that is what she wanted, he would make it happen. She always wondered why he asked. "He knew I really loved the Dominican sisters when I was at Sacred Heart and I used to help clean the church and help with CCD class and all that kind of thing. And so that night he asked me, he said I think we should meet the sisters at St. Elizabeth."

Her other siblings were about to start school. He made a call and the sisters said to bring her over. She had a meal and a great time with them. "They were tons of fun, and so again, I started helping to clean the church and helping with religion class and all kinds of things that they needed to have done." Sister Cecilia was the principal at the time and they lived in Mitchell. One day, they passed her walking on the way home and Sister Stephanie with her siblings as a Novtold her, "Your mom has supper ready. Go home and eat. We're going to pick you up at 6 ice at the Mother House. o'clock to take you to the Mother House." That happened on a Wednesday and she was there full time by Saturday. She was 13 years old and finished high school there.



She began her vocation as a postulant, which is one seeking admission to a religious order. She then entered a canonical year, which was a year in which she could not leave the Mother House, followed by the second year novitiate or novice year where

they could leave. At this point she and the others were enrolled at Marillac College, which they lovingly referred to as 'West Point for Nuns.' She further explained that if you were an 'A' student at other schools, you were a 'B' student there.

After this, they renewed their vows each year for five years, received their black veil and were sent out to teach. Her congregation is of German origin as were her grandparents. "I remember how excited I was when I first got to go to Germany. At the time I was working at our hospital. They took me to their two hospitals and showed me everything." Her parents raised her, her two brothers, and her two sisters with a strong work ethic in a family of faith. While she was the only sibling to join a religious community, her brother Bob ultimately became a social worker after exploring being ordained a priest.

Sister taught school for 12 years and would come home and go to school all summer. Once she got her bachelor's degree, "'We thought we had the world on a string," but

their provincial said she "wanted us back for a Master's degree and don't wait until you are too comfortable and don't want to go back." She enrolled to become a speech pathologist. She was teaching in Brussels, Illinois and shared many of the services between public and the Catholic schools. She saw that schools were closing at a rapid pace, so this was the profession she chose. She felt it gave her the best choices between using this at school if she continued to teach or even to open her own practice. "I wasn't finished for two days with that degree when Sister Mary Thomas was calling me from the hospital, 'We'd like you to come here.'" She began working at the hospital in the rehab unit. There were several 'surprises' to that. She worked there for 12 years and then was asked to consider a degree in hospital administration. "I thought they had lost their marbles."

After a bit of conversation, she went with the suggestion and excelled. She then entered the Health Care Ethics program at SLU

and she got an additional degree for that. She worked in administration, helping people through end of life decisions, and helping the hospital navigate the ethical parts. Not long after this, the hospital was closed. She enjoyed her time there, but also had a scary time or two, being physically attacked in the child psych unit.

When asked who her biggest influence was, she quickly mentioned Sister Mary Thomas, "A great role model, a sweetheart, good good good person and a woman that was ahead of her time. I remember when she started the clinic in Granite to get kids their shots. Dr. Trtanj recently told her of his initial visits to the hospital upon returning from military service with all of the dental training he received He presented to Sister Mary Thomas about how they needed these service. He left, never expecting a call back. But he was put on staff, equipment purchased and away they went. She recalled when Sister Mary Thomas won Woman of Distinction how she was embarrassed, 'That's not why you choose to serve'. Only got to do her true calling which was nursing love for about a year before being asked to go back to school to be an administrator."



Sister at Final Vows


Sister Stephanie was here at our school just a couple of weeks ago, speaking to the female students in our third and fourth grades. Her message to them, "I really encourage these girls. These days you could really go into most [religious] communities with any kind of job skill, unless it's a contemplative community. Going to college they could be a business major, or they could be a nurse, they could be a doctor. I really encourage them that way because I told them what our mission is, making God's love visible. That's really what every community is trying to do. They may have other mission statements but we're all trying to do that in some way now. You can do that now, just with your classmates and your friends. Look for the people that are left out, nobody wants to sit with, nobody wants to play with. Bring them in! There are so many things you can do in a community to make a big difference in the world."

Sister's biggest joy has been in the ministries she's done. Teaching, hospital administration, and helping people recover their speech have all in their own way been enjoyable and fulfilling. "I used to wonder if people think I don't like teaching now that

I am at the hospital. I was always worried people would think I'm fickle. I love teaching, always taught second grade. Ilove the little kids!"

Her overall message to us all: "I think it would be to love Jesus. Love Jesus and spread that all around. I think that's the biggest thing we need now with so much hate in the world."

Sister, thank you for saying yes and for your loving witness to us all about sacrifice and service. We love you and appreciate your example and prayers.

## CELEBRATING SUNDAYS FOR CATHOLIC FAMILIES

This is from a book called 'Celebrating Sunday for Catholic Families' by Kerri Mecke-Lazano. It includes the Gospel, a reflection, a question to ponder before AND after Mass as well as a section called Living the Word to consider how you can take the Gospel with you for the rest of the week. Please use them to help you and your family get more out of the Mass each week!

#### **HEARING THE WORD:**

Read Matthew 25:1-13

#### REFLECTING ON THE WORD

As parents, we often prepare for a myriad of family gatherings, taking care of the arrangements and putting every detail in order. Preparation is essential, whether we are getting ready for a birthday party, a family reunion, or a wedding feast as in today's Gospel. At the time of Jesus, oil was used in clay lamps to provide light. Five of the young women bring extra oil, so that their lamps would remain lit, while five foolish young women are unprepared and do not have the necessary oil. They find themselves in darkness, locked outside of the wedding feast. We are called to be diligent in our spiritual preparation, so that we may walk in the light.

#### ON THE WAY TO MASS

Ask your children, "How can we be prepared to receive Jesus when he comes to us?" Think about the ways you prepare yourself for Mass and to receive Jesus in the Eucharist. What else can you do to prepare your hearts for Mass?

#### ON THE WAY HOME FROM MASS

What do you think Jesus meant when he talked about keeping our light burning? How can we make sure we are ready to meet him when he comes?

#### LIVING THE WORD

Recall your children's response to the question of how we can keep our light burning. Invite them to choose one idea to live out in the week ahead, so that you are prepared to welcome the Bridegroom when he comes.



#### **SACRAMENTS**

**Reconciliation:** If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

**Anointing of the Sick:** Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

**Infant & Child Baptism:** For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

**Matrimony:** To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

#### PASTORAL CARE

**Entering the Church:** If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

**Declarations of Nullity:** In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
