

From our Pastor Father Alfred



Dear Saint Elizabeth Parishioners and School Families,

Merry Christmas & Happy New Year 2024! "For a child is born to us, a son is given us, upon his shoulder dominion rests. They name him Wonder-Counselor, God-Hero, Father-Forever, Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:5-6).

These words: "a child is born to us, a son is given us" speak to me of how this festive season is a "Communal Celebration" not just a family affair for us Catholics and the whole world. It takes a community of us to whom "a child is born to us, a son is given us" to delight in this Holy Season starting from making quality Christmas cookies, putting up the Christmas tree, wrapping and opening the Christmas presents, etc. to attending the Christ's Mass (Christmas) - the Holy Day of Obligation. According to Merriam-Webster Dictionary, a community is "a unified body of individuals: such as a group of people with a common characteristic or interest living together within a larger society." We are therefore a Christian community for the fact that "a child is born to us, a son is given us" and His name is Jesus Christ.

During these Christmas festivities and celebrations, I am making a trip to my home country Uganda, for my one-month annual vacation, leaving on December 31, 2023, arriving in Uganda on January 1, 2024. In Uganda, "a child is born to us, a son is given us." Thinking of this brings me to some of the most beautiful memories surrounding the communal celebration of Christmas in that part of the world – known as the pearl of Africa! Well, there is not so much the giving of presents in the celebration of Christmas in Uganda, but the GIVING OF PRESENCE. Whereas most people do not have the financial resources to buy gifts such as toys. Everyone from the community will gather in one place/family and celebrate from there, for several days.

Christmas in Uganda comes at a time marking the end of the harvest of the main millet-growing season. As a child I remember it would take us weeks' work to grind some 20 kilograms of millet for a team of two or three people in a family, echoing the festive mood among family members despite the laborious task. The only equipment in use is the hand-powered Africas grinding mill (curved out stone), mortar, and pestle (as in the photo). This was and still is the traditional process of making fine cassava, millet, and sorghum flour. The flour is mingled into millet bread and the sorghum flour is used to make sweetie porridge (obushera). Besides millet flour, they also use other easily available farm produce like Matooke which is a special kind of banana. It is harvested green, peeled, and boiled or steamed in banana leaves.

When they are cooked, they turn yellow. Matooke is best served mashed. Christmas cooking starts on the night of 24 December. My mother (of beautiful memory) used to do most of the cooking preparation on Christmas Eve and then wake up at 4 am on Christmas morning to start the cooking. When we woke at 6 or 7 am, she would mash the matooke and then move on to boiling the chicken or meat for the special feast. Christmas Meal is a shared meal with extended family members, and invitations are given to neighbors, guests, and sometimes visiting Christmas carol groups. All this meal continues until the New Year.

There are also other chores during the season apart from meal preparations and sharing, such as cleaning and decorating homes. Days before Christmas, children and other family members decorate the house and the path leading to the house/family with locally available banana leaves/stems and all sorts of wild and locally grown flowers for Christmas decorations. Also, many families use other decorative materials like hangings and ornaments made of paper on Christmas and New Year. One of my favorite childhood Christmas memories was listening to a carol group singing on the night of Christmas eve and participating in Children's plays after Christmas mass accompanied by singing and dancing. Sometimes there are also competitions from youth from different churches on the church premises. The parishes carry out competitions for children to participate in Nativity scenes and distribute prizes on Christmas Day.

The best part for me as a priest was the Parish preparations that begin with the season of Advent to help parishioners prepare for Christmas. These range from priest's exhortations given in different mission outstations through Advent "Safari" to give the Sacrament of Confession to prepare for Christmas, to Catholic volunteers who show up to clean up and decorate the Church campus and the Church buildings.

Now all these are acts of communal joy and spiritual practices that boost faith and unity among the community for "a child is born to us, a son is given us." As we celebrate Christmas together in our families and as Saint Elizabeth family of God, let us keep the communal celebration vibrant, by GIVING OF PRESENCE to one another for unto us "a child is born, a son is given." Christmas time is a communal celebration for us, as it was for shepherds in that region of Bethlehem living in the fields and keeping the night watch over their flock, who joined the multitude of the heavenly host with the angel, praising God and saying: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." (Luke 2:14). As we celebrate Jesus's coming at Christmas, may there be peace and joy in our families, and communities, our nation and in the world surrounded by upheaval. Together, let us bring Christ's peace with us into these tumultuous situations!

CELEBRATING CHRISTMAS FOR CATHOLIC FAMILIES

This is from 'Celebrating Sunday for Catholic Families' by Kerri Mecke-Lazano. It includes the Gospel, a reflection, a question to ponder before AND after Mass as well as a section called Living the Word to consider how you can take the Gospel with you for the rest of the week. Please use them to help you and your family get more out of the Mass each week!

(For the Gospel at the Mass During the Night) HEARING THE WORD: Read Luke 2:1, 4-7a, 8-14

REFLECTING ON THE WORD

Mary wrapped her baby in swaddling clothes. Newborn babies feel safe and comfortable when they are wrapped in a blanket, nice and snug. Then Mary lays him in a manger, which is a feeding trough for animals. Jesus is so precious, but is placed in a manger where animals feed. This child is born in such humble conditions, and yet will be a gift that brings joy for all people, glory to God, and peace on earth.

ON THE WAY TO MASS

Today, we will hear about the shepherds who visit the baby Jesus. after he was born. Perhaps the shepherds didn't know clearly who Jesus was then, but we do today. What do we know about who Jesus is.

ON THE WAY HOME FROM MASS

What did the angel say? "Do not be afraid! A savior has been born! You will find the infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." Why do you think Jesus came as a helpless baby wrapped in swaddling clothes rather than as a powerful king with an army? What could this mean for us?

LIVING THE WORD

What do babies need? Make a list. While we may not be able to purchase items for baby Jesus or for a child in need, we can offer something to Jesus at this moment. Sit quietly with your Nativity set, tell Jesus what is in your heart. You may say it aloud, quietly in your heart, or write it down as a prayer.

CHOIR

EXTRAORDINARY MINISTERS OF HOLY COMMUNION (EMHCs)

When needs warrant, EMHCs assist the ordinary ministers of Communion (the priest and deacon) with the distribution of Holy Communion. Additionally, some of them volunteer to assist Father and Deacon with carrying Communion to those who are unable to join the community for Mass.

GREETERS

Our greeters meet people at the door and ensure they feel welcome here at St. Elizabeth.

LECTORS

Our lectors proclaim the Word of God in the readings at Mass.

USHERS

Ushers help ensure everyone has a seat, all things remain safe and orderly, and issues or distractions are handled during liturgies, in addition to helping with the collection at offertory.

STEWARDSHIP

150 CLUB

The 150 Club welcomes members who contribute each year for the opportunity at a monthly cash raffle drawing and then grand prize cash raffles at the year-end dinner event. In turn, the 150 Club provides a significant financial gift back to the parish each year.

BINGO COMMITTEE

The True Meaning of Christmas, Lukas Storyteller

HEARING THE WORD:

Luke 1:31-38

REFLECTING ON THE WORD

Today's Gospel invites us to ponder the names of Jesus. First, the angel tells Mary that she will bear a son and that his name will be Jesus. The angel also reveals that this tiny child will also be called Son of the Most High and Son of God. To be given the title "Son of" signifies a very close relationship with God, for Jesus is God made flesh. Finally, the angel also tells us that Jesus comes from a long line of servants of God, descending from both the throne of David and from the house of Jacob, two other mighty names in salvation history. Jesus' identity is so rich, so big, and so mysterious that he cannot be identified by one name or image. Many names are needed for us to understand who he is.

ON THE WAY TO MASS

The name Jesus means "one who saves." Listen for how often we refer to Jesus' holy name or to Jesus as Savior during Mass.

ON THE WAY HOME FROM MASS

The Holy Spirit was a part of Jesus' birth story. How has the Holy Spirit been with you since the earliest days of your life?

SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
