The Woman at the Well

The First Scrutiny of the Elect is celebrated this Sunday, the Third Sunday of Lent, and includes the proclamation of John 4:5-42, commonly known as "The Woman at the Well."

En route from Judea to Galilee, Jesus had to pass through Samaria. In the heat of mid-day, worn from the journey, he sat down at a well, at the same time a Samaraian woman came to draw water from the well. The heat of the mid-day sun wasn't usually the time to draw water - it's possible she was avoiding other women from the

Despite the rules of the day prohibiting Jews from speaking to Samaritans, or unmarried men and women con-

versing in public, Jesus asked the woman for a drink.

The woman, we learn, has had five husbands and is now living with another man who isn't her husband. In the conversation, Jesus reveals that he knows her past. He also tells her that if she knew who He was, she would ask Him for living water, and He would give it to her - and that those who drink of His water never thirst again.

We know, of course, that Jesus's "living water" is a metaphor for divine grace. The well of God's grace desires to refresh the soul damaged by sin and suffering, and that Jesus came to save the sick and serve those who still need both physical and spiritual healing.

Through the conversation, the woman ends up undersatnding that Jesus is the Messiah, the Christ - and she heads back to

town to spread the word and bring her whole village to believe in Jesus.

We celebrate the Scrutinies for the Elect preparing to enter the Church through the Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil. We remember that they, like the Samaritan woman, are on the verge of a deep and permanent conversion.

Like the Elect on the journey they have already udnergone, the woman at the well begins without knowledge of who and what Jesus is. Slowly they gain a more full understanding of His divine nature. To be able to see Jesus for who He is, to be able to accept the divine grace He is giving, you must be firm in your conviction to turn

away from sin - a grace for the Elect for which we pray in the Scruitines.

"The Scrutinies are meant to uncover, and then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. For the Scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth, and the life." -**Creighton University Online Ministries**

We join with the Elect, we strengthen the Elect, we pray with the Elect and for the Elect through the spiritual experiences of the Scrutinies. We will join with them and relive our Baptismal promise as we die again to sin in the Baptismal font with the Elect on Easter Sunday and are reborn again with Jesus into new life, eternal life.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



Soon our diocese will take up The Catholic Relief Services Collection. Your support for this collection provides emergency assistance to victims of war and natural disasters; assists migrants and refugees who need housing, education, and specialized legal assistance; and supports travelers and others whose livelihoods require special pastoral support to access the sacraments. In addition to aiding those with immediate needs, your support helps long-term efforts to build peace in regions that have been affected by decades of conflict- such as the Korean peninsula.

Although active fighting in the Korean War ceased with an armistice agreement in 1953, a lasting peace has never been established. In the intervening 70 years, relations among North Korea, South Korea, and the United States have grown in complexity, especially with the increasing recent threat of nuclear weapons.

The Catholic Church seeks to prevent the scourge of war and the proliferation of nuclear weapons, as a world mission and voice to build lasting peace in place of war. The Catholic Institute of Northeast Asia Peace (CINAP) was founded in 2015 to strengthen communications among the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Korea, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Japan, and the Holy See. In 2017, CINAP hosted its first international conference, the Catholic Korea Peace Forum.

After several years of virtual meetings due to pandemic restrictions, the sixth annual Catholic Korea Peace Forum gathered in October 2022 in Washington, DC, bringing together church leaders from North and South Korea and the United States-including the USCCB's International Justice and Peace (IJP) committee chairman- as well as experts, scholars, and government officials from the United States, South Korea, and Japan. As co-organizer of the Forum, IJP was integral to the Church's mission to pray and work for just and lasting peace on the Korean peninsula. This crucial work is made possible with the support IJP receives from The Catholic Relief Services Collection.


PLEASE PRAY FOR ZOEY

SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: If you have been away from the Church and the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, feel free to contact the parish office for guidance & materials to help you prepare to return to the Sacraments. In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you could also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Anointing of the Sick is appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism and sign up for a Baptism Preparation class at least a month before your desired date of Baptism. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office. Baptisms are usually celebrated after the 10:30 Mass most Sundays or at 7 p.m. some Wednesdays.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Father Alfred, Deacon Michael, and Laura Black are available as Advocates before our diocesan tribunal for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
