

Pope Francis' Prayer Intention for November: **For anyone who has lost a child:** We pray that all parents who mourn the loss of a son or daughter find support in their community and receive peace and consolation from the Holy Spirit.

This Sunday: 32nd Sunday in Ord. Time 1 Kqs 17:10-16; Heb 9:24-28; Mk 12:38-44 Elijah goes to Zarephath, where he asks a widow for water and bread. She brings him the water but tells him she does not have much left for bread. He tells her to not be afraid and that her supply will not go empty. In the second reading, the author writes that Christ appear[ed] before God on our behalf. In the Gospel, Jesus observes a widow contribute to the treasury and teaches his disciples that her gift is worth far more than the gifts of the rich.

Next Sunday: 33rd Sunday in Ord. Time Dn 12:1-3; Heb 10:11-14, 18; Mk 13:24-32 Daniel prophesies of a great prince, Michael, arising as a guardian of the people. Some of the dead will awaken and live forever, others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace. In the second reading, the author writes of the one[who] offered one sacrifice for sins, and took his seat forever at the right hand of God. In the Gospel, Jesus speaks to his disciples about the days after that tribulation, when they will see "the Son of Man coming in the clouds" with great power and glory.

We would like to thank everyone who came out to pray at the abortion facility in Granite City during our 40 Days for Life campaign. Every campaign God continues to bring more and more people out to the sidewalk to pray. This campaign was truly a testimony to that fact!

All of the prayer hours were covered for 40 straight days for 12 hours a day in a prayerful and peaceful manner and lives were saved!

Fruits of these 40 days:

- 1. 11 Babies were saved during the 40 days!
- 2. 1,657 hours were peacefully prayed! This is the second most hours prayed in a campaign!
- 3. Over 70 hours were prayed by our clergy and religious brothers and sisters, the most of any campaign we've had!
- 4. This is the eleventh campaign in Granite City. The total number of babies saved during those campaigns is 133 and the total number of hours prayed is 17,719.

These campaigns are absolutely impressive! Once again our prayer partners are awesome and are the focus of a successful campaign.

Christ reminds us that he is with us as we go forth in our lives, both in our trials and the blessings he provides.

From the U.S. Bishops' Document Go Make Disciples...

How Evangelization Happens (¶34-44), continued...

37. Certainly, our families, parishes, associations, schools, hospitals, charitable works, and institutions give a powerful witness to the faith. But do they share it? Does their living faith lead to the conversion of minds and hearts to Jesus Christ? Does the fire of the Holy Spirit blaze in them? This plan and strategy aims to make Catholics in the United States, individually and as a Church, better sharers of God's Good News.

In Sharing the Gospel with Others

38. The Holy Spirit also evangelizes through our attempts to reach those who have given up the practice of their Catholic faith for one reason or another and those who have no family of faith. Many in our Catholic community know family members, friends, and neighbors who do not have or practice faith.

39. Millions of Catholics no longer practice their faith. Although many of them may say they are Catholic, they no longer worship with the community and thereby deprive themselves of the gifts of word and sacrament. Some were never formed in the faith after their childhood. Some have drifted away because of one or another issue. Some feel alienated from the Church because of the way they perceive the Church or its teaching. Some have left because they were mistreated by church representatives.

40. As a community of faith, we want to welcome these people to become alive in the Good News of Jesus, to make their lives more fully a part of the ongoing story of salvation and to let Christ touch, heal, and reconcile them through the Holy Spirit. We want to let our inactive brothers and sisters know that they always have a place in the Church and that we are hurt by their absence—as they are. We want to show our regret for any misunderstandings or mistreatment. And we want to help them see that, however they feel about the Church, we want to talk with them, share with them, and accept them as brothers and sisters. Every Catholic can be a minister of welcome, reconciliation, and understanding to those who have stopped practicing the faith.

41. Our plan also asks Catholics to reach out to those who do not belong to a faith community and to invite them to consider the power of the Gospel of Jesus, which the riches of the Catholic Church can bring into their lives. Perhaps this may seem the most difficult of all the tasks evangelization asks of us. Yet if we have once seen the joy of those received into the Church at Easter, if we have ever experienced the growth of those going through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, if we have ever seen someone thrilled with the Gospel for the first time in his or her life, we know that this is, in truth, one of the sweetest gifts of the Spirit.

LEARNING & LIVING OUR FAITH

In an interesting twist, Monday, December 9 is a Holy Day of Obligation this year

This year, December 8th, the *Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary*, falls on a Sunday, but the celebration of that feast is moved to the next day, Monday, December 9. It <u>is</u> a Holy Day of Obligation.

When most Solemnities in the General Calendar of liturgical days fall on a Sunday, they are automatically moved to the next day, the Monday. That's the case this year with the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. It falls on Sunday, December 8, but it is superceded on that day by the celebration of the Second Sunday of Advent; therefore, it is moved to Monday, December 9.

You might be thinking, in recent years, when a Holy Day of Obligation like this has moved to Saturday or Monday our bishops in the United States have informed us that the obligation to attend Mass was lifted.

Since 1992, the norms of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, which has the authority to adapt the universal laws of the Church for specific circumstances in the United States, have stated that when certain holy days fall on a Saturday or a Monday, the obligation to attend Mass is lifted - removing an "undo burden" for the faithful to attend Mass on Sunday AND on Saturday or Monday.

Recently, though, at the request of various bishops, Bishop Paprocki wrote to the Dicastery for Legislative Texts at the Vatican, in his capacity as Chairman of the USCCB's *Committee on Canonical Affairs and Church Governance*. On behalf of the bishops, he posed the question: "If a Holy Day of Obligation in the Advent, Lent or Easter season falls on a Sunday and the Solemnity is transferred to Monday, does the obligation to attend Mass still apply?" The Dicastery for Legislative Texts replied affirmatively; the obligation remains even when the Solemnity is transferred because the Solemnity itself is a day of obligation.

As a result, this year, in the United States (as it is in most of the world), the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception will be celebrated on Monday, December 9, and will be a Holy Day of Obligation.

This is in addition to the regular obligation to attend Mass on Sunday.

We are adding one Mass here at St. Elizabeth on Monday, December 9, at 8:15 a.m. Other options in the area include:

- 6 p.m. at Holy Family, Granite City
- 6:30 p.m. at St. Cecilia, Glen Carbon (after Reconciliation at 6 p.m.)
- 6:30 p.m. at St. Mary's, Edwardsville

Please consider these sections of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* which apply:

§2181 The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor.* Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin.

§2185 On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful are to refrain from engaging in work or activities that hinder the worship owed to God, the joy proper to the Lord's Day, the performance of the works of mercy, and the appropriate relaxation of mind and body. Family needs or important social service can legitimately excuse from the obligation of Sunday rest. The faithful should see to it that legitimate excuses do not lead to habits prejudicial to religion, family life, and health.

*Canon 1245 of the Code of Canon Law allows a parish priest, in individual cases, for a just reason and in accordance with the prescriptions of the diocesan Bishop, to give a dispensation from the obligation of observing a holyday or day of penance, or commute the obligation into some other pious works. If you're legitimately unable to attend Mass and fulfill your obligation on Monday, December 9,



WEEKLY STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

"I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury.

For they all contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in

everything she had, her whole living." - Mark 12:43-44

Jesus gets right to the point – we are all called to give money to support the mission of the Church, regardless of our circumstance. No gift is too small or insignificant! Giving money to support the mission of our local parish is a matter of our faith, just like praying and participating in parish ministries. When you make a financial offering, is it from your "first fruits" or from what is "left over"?

SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you can also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism at least a month before your desired date. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Advocates are available for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
