# Wait! Why are the Christmas Decorations still up?

Already done with Christmas? We're just getting started! Here are five reasons you should keep celebrating Christmas until Candlemas on February 2nd (from ChurchPop.com):

#### 1) Candlemas is the traditional end of the Christmas season.

Candlemas is every year on February 2. It is the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord and the Purification of Our Lady when Our Lady and Saint Joseph presented their firstborn Son in the Temple in accordance with the law. Mary, by law, had to wait 40 days to go to the temple after giving birth. While she did not need purification, she submitted to the law God established.

So, really for all of January, we can remember Jesus as a newborn and Our Lady and Saint Joseph facing the daily adjustment that all first-time parents face. This liturgical season was called the "Time After Epiphany" on the old liturgical calendar.

#### 2) Since Advent and Christmas are such a busy time, it is much easier to focus on the birth of Christ after the days of feasting.

The parties are over. The feasts are eaten. The presents are unwrapped. Finally, we can get back to a more normal pace of life. Christians' normal pace of life includes daily prayer. Why not use the time after the birth of Christ, while the liturgical year waits to present Him in the temple, to contemplate further the wonder of the Word made flesh?

#### 3) In the bleak season of January, we need a little Christmas spirit.

January, much more than December, needs a little cheering up. In the northern parts of the world, the snow on the ground had turned into gray slush and ice. Everything is gray and glum, and absurdly less-than-freezing-cold temperatures plague us. It is not Lent yet, so why take on the penance of ceasing to celebrate before you have to?

#### 4) Most Christmas music is still appropriate after Christmas.

You can skip all the songs about Santa and longing to be home for Christmas and focus on the carols about Christ's birth. Newborn babies are not forgotten 12 days after their birth but are cared for and loved as they grow. We can do the same for Christ. Let us enjoy the babymoon with Our Lady, singing about the birth of her Son as long as we can! Further, all the non-religious winter carols are still very appropriate in January in snowy and cold places.

#### 5) Knowing we can celebrate Christmas for 40 days, keep Christmas cookie consumption in moderation.

Celebrating Christmas longer is actually good for your diet. Instead of cramming all cookies in before Epiphany, we can eat them more moderately. Pacing ourselves so that the cookies and candy last until February 2 is a healthful idea! Further, depending on when Lent starts, one could save some for some Mardi Gras consumption.

#### 'He Loved Us': Pope Francis' new encyclical on the Sacred Heart of Jesus

"Dilexit nos," Pope Francis' fourth Encyclical, retraces the tradition and relevance of thought on "the human and divine love of the heart of Jesus Christ," calling for a renewal of authentic devotion to avoid forgetting the tenderness of faith, the joy of serving, and the fervour of mission.

"'He loved us', Saint Paul says of Christ (cf. Rom 8:37), in order to make us realize that nothing can ever "separate us" from that love (Rom 8:39)": Thus begins Pope Francis' fourth Encyclical, which takes its title from the opening words, *Dilexit nos*.

The Encyclical is dedicated to the human and divine love of the Heart of Jesus Christ: "His open heart has gone before us and waits for us, unconditionally, asking only to offer us His love and friendship," the Pope writes in the introductory paragraph. "For 'He loved us first' (cf. 1 Jn 4:10). Because of Jesus, 'we have come to know and believe in the love that God has for us' (1 Jn 4:16)."

#### The love of Christ represented in His Sacred Heart

In our societies, the Pope writes, "we are also seeing a proliferation of varied forms of religiosity that have nothing to do with a personal relationship with the God of love" (87), while Christianity often forgets "the tender consolations of faith, the joy of serving others, the fervour of personal commitment to mission" (88).

In response, Pope Francis proposes a new reflection on the love of Christ represented in His Holy

Heart. He calls for a renewal of "authentic devotion" (163) to the Sacred Heart, recalling that in the Heart of Christ "we find the whole Gospel" (89). It is in His Heart that "we truly come at last to know ourselves and we learn to love" (30).

In Peru, missionaries working in the Peruvian Amazon bring the Gospel to the Ashaninka and Matsigenka communities of about 60,000 people.

Such encounters and engagement with the people of South America are made possible when Catholics in our diocese are generous to the Collection for the Church in Latin America. Your participation in the collection truly becomes a way to share your faith and support evangelization efforts among all people.

I'm not saying that my tired, mumbled morning prayer is transformed into the grace I require to be a perfect saint the rest of the day, but it's enough to remind me of my need for someone stronger than myself to help me bear the day with patience. And when the only prayer I can manage at Mass is something like "Well, I'm here," and I sincerely offer him that. Jesus takes it and blesses it, along with the gifts on the altar. Together, they're transformed into something greater than we could have ever asked for or imagined: the Bread of Life.

# SACRAMENTS

**Reconciliation:** In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you can also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism at least a month before your desired date. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office.

**Matrimony:** To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

# PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

**Communion to the Homebound:** If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Advocates are available for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
