
Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion ◆ April 13, 2025



Holy Week & The Triduum: The Holiest Days of the Church Year

At the heart of our Christian faith is the fact that God sent his Son, born as a man Jesus Christ, to undergo his passion and death and to rise from the dead, to atone for our sins and to open for us the gates of eternal life. That is what we celebrate every Sunday, but most especially this week of the Church year.

The summit of the whole Church year is the Easter Triduum, from the evening Mass of Holy Thursday through Evening Prayer of Easter Sunday. In three days, it is liturgically one event unfolding Christ's Paschal Mystery.

Lent ends and the Triduum begins at the start of the Mass on the evening of Holy Thursday and ends with Evening Prayer II (Vespers) on Easter Sunday night.

Mass begins as usual on Holy Thursday with an Entrance Antiphon. But it doesn't end on Holy Thursday. Rather than a

blessing and dismissal, the liturgy continues with a Solemn Procession, taking the remaining Blessed Sacrament to a place of repose. We are invited to come for quiet prayer and adoration until Midnight, recalling and entering into Jesus' prayer in his Agony in the Garden.

Good Friday of the Lord's Passion is the only day during the Church year on which there is liturgy but no Mass. The Triddum continues with a solemn entrance in silence. in which ordained ministers fall prostrate upon the floor at the hour our Lord died on the cross. The proclamation of the Passion from the Gospel of John, veneration of the cross, and reception of the Eucharist remaining from Holy Thursday are part of this portion of the Triduum.

The Triduum continues with the Vigil in the Holy Night of Easter. We bless the Paschal Candle for the year, proclaim Scriptures

recalling all of salvation history, proclaim Jesus's Resurrection, and welcome new Catholics with the Sacraments of Initiation.

The Triduum continues for one more day, through the remaining Masses of Easter Sunday morning in which we continue the celebration of Jesus' Resurrection, and through Vespers (Evening Prayer) of Easter Sunday. That concludes the Triduum.

The Easter season then continues for fifty days until Pentecost. These are days of heightened ongoing celebration of the single most important things that have happened in human history.

It's tempting to end this column with the "'A' word" that we've avoided all Lent but will get to sing again at the Easter Vigil, but it's not time yet. In the meantime, praise to Jesus Christ, King of endless Glory!

April is dedicated to the Holy Eucharist

Pope Francis' Prayer Intention for April: For the use of new technologies:

Let us pray that the use of the new technologies will not replace human relationships, will respect the dignity of the person, and will help us face the crises of our times.

This Sunday: Palm Sunday

Lk 19:28-40; Is 50:4-7; Phil 2:6-11; Lk 22:14-23:56 Jesus proceeds to Jerusalem, where he is welcomed as a king with shouts of joy praising God for his mighty deeds. In the first reading, Isaiah prophesies of one who does not shield his face from buffets or spitting, knowing he will not be put to shame. Paul writes that Christ humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death on a cross. In the Gospel, Jesus celebrates Passover with his friends, speaks of his imminent betrayal, and after hours of interrogation and torture, is handed over to be crucified.

Next Sunday: Easter Sunday

Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Col 3:1-4; 1 Cor 5:6b-8
In the first reading, Peter speaks about Jesus' ministry, death, and resurrection. He recounts his appearances to chosen witnesses, whom he commissioned to preach in his name. Paul urges the Colossians to focus on what is heavenly. In the Gospel, Mary Magdalene discovers the tomb empty and tells Simon Peter and another disciple who run to the tomb and see the burial cloths.

Good Friday Fast Reminder

Those ages 18-59, in reasonable health, are required to fast on Good Friday. Those 14 and older must abstain from meat. Children, adults with physical and mental illness, pregnant women and those nursing are all exempt. The USCCB stresses that "common sense should prevail" and that no one should jeopardize their health to fast. Canon Law does mention that for young children not fasting, parents should still communicate the meaning and penance.

Lent ends at the beginning of the Triduum (Evening Mass on Holy Thursday), but Lenten fasting and personal commitments usually continue until Easter. Papal document *Paschalis Solemnitatis* recommends this in order that we "with uplifted and welcoming heart be ready to celebrate the joys of the Sunday of the resurrection."

DIVINE MERCY NOVENA

The Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday, April 18, and ends on April 27, the Second Sunday of Easter. In the message to St. Faustina, Our Lord requested that the first Sunday after Easter be the Feast of Mercy. On April 30, 2000, Pope John Paul II declared that the Second Sunday of Easter would be celebrated as Divine Mercy Sunday through the whole Church. On that same day he canonized Sister Faustina as the first "Saint of the Jubilee Year of Mercy." After completing the Novena in 2005, Pope John Paul II died on the eve of Mercy Sunday. He was beatified on Mercy Sunday in 2011 by Pope Benedict XVI and canonized by Pope Francis on April 27, 2014.



Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet with us through the Novena, starting just after the Good Friday 3:00 p.m. liturgy, each day at 3:00 p.m. (at the church, or where you are), ending in the church at 3:00 p.m. on Divine Mercy Sunday.

"Our Lord spoke these words to St. Faustina, 'My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the Fount of My Mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened."" (Diary, 699)

The First Friday Memorial is a special offering made by parishioners of St. Elizabeth Parish, which lists your intentions for deceased loved ones in our bulletin, and these listed names are then remembered monthly at Mass each First Friday throughout the entire year. The Memorial names are printed each week in our Sunday Bulletin. A yearly donation of \$60.00 is requested for these intentions to be listed.

This donation allows the names to be printed constantly in our bulletin, in the exact same way other bulletin ads are funded, and all the funds go to offset the cost of printing our bulletin. This is not a donation for a Mass intention since the money does not, and by Canon Law cannot, go into the Mass stipend account, as taking any money for large, so-called "collective intentions" (where multiple names are listed for the Mass intention) is explicitly forbidden. Father is happy to remember these names collectively once a month at Mass with no stipend involved. Your donation is a publishing/printing fee, ultimately paid to our printer in Godfrey, Illinois.

You are encouraged to attend this weekday Mass. You may list your intentions as one individual name: Mary Jones, or you may list family groupings: The Jones Family. You may NOT submit a litany of individual names or multiple families, as space will not permit. If you wish to continue having your past intentions remembered at these Masses, you will be asked to renew your donation each year. Please fill out this form below and return it to the Parish Office as soon as possible with the requested donation.

Luke 19:36-40

REFLECTING ON THE WORD:

Although the crowd's shouts of exuberant praise of Jesus on Palm Sunday will devolve into shouts of "Crucify him!" by Good Friday, we join them in praising the Lord on this day. In fact, we take up the crowd's chorus every time we go to Mass and sing, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest." In today's Gospel, the Pharisees complain to Jesus, hoping he'll restrain the crowd's unseemly demonstration. But Jesus replies that if the crowd weren't crying out, the stones would. Praise of the Lord is good, and not just for those who will never turn around and deny Jesus. The entire world, even now in its brokenness, was created to give glory to God, and our families are part of that. What could that look like in our homes?

What are different ways we can offer God praise?

ON THE WAY HOME FROM MASS

Did Jesus stop the crowds from waving their palms and giving him praise? Why?

UPCOMING SPECIAL & SECOND COLLECTIONS



Please contact the Parish office if you are currently not receiving envelopes and would like to start using them for all your contributions.

April 17: CRS Rice Bowl (Holy Thursday) – This appeal provides funding for many third world self-help projects promoting agricultural, nutritional, educational growth and self-sufficiency. 75% is remitted to Catholic Relief Services for overseas projects, and 25% may be retained in the diocese for local antipoverty programs.

April 18: Holy Land (Good Friday) – This collection assists in the care and maintenance of Holy Sites, as well as assisting Christians who remain – often in difficulty – in the lands where Jesus lived.

April 20: Seminarians (Easter Sunday) – This collection helps form and educate the future priests of the diocese. In partnership with generous benefactors in the Good Shephard Society, your gift will secure financial support for these young men on their discernment journey.

"...I tell you, Peter, before the cock crows this day, you will deny three times that you know me." - Luke 22:34

How many times have you heard someone make a disparaging comment about God or our Catholic faith? How did you react? Do you remain quiet so as not to cause disturbance? Or, because you don't want people to think negatively about you? Or, because you don't think you know enough about the Catholic faith? Pray for the courage to speak up and enter into a respectful conversation when the opportunity to talk about our faith arises. Joyfully share your faith with others.

SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation: In addition to Confessions offered from 3-4 p.m. on Saturdays, you can also schedule an individual time for Reconciliation.

Anointing of the Sick: Appropriate for any upcoming surgery, prolonged illness, or in the event of emergency or danger of death. Please call the office if you or a loved one needs to be anointed.

Infant & Child Baptism: For children under the age of 8, please submit the forms at stelizabethgc.org/baptism at least a month before your desired date. For questions or emergencies, please contact the Parish Office.

Matrimony: To begin preparation for Holy Matrimony, please contact the parish office to set up initial appointments and preparation at least six months (recommended twelve months) before your desired date. At least an introductory interview must be completed before a date can be set.

Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, first Holy Communion) for children 8 and over, or for adults: Contact the parish office.

PASTORAL CARE

Entering the Church: If you are new to the Catholic faith and interested in learning more about the church or about entering the church, welcome! Contact the parish office for a meeting with Father Alfred or Deacon Michael.

Communion to the Homebound: If you or a family member are, or are going to be, homebound, whether at home or in a care facility, please notify the parish office. Medical and care facilities are unable to inform us of their Catholic residents and patients. We would be happy to arrange to visit and bring you Holy Communion. Please contact the parish office for arrangements.

Declarations of Nullity: In some cases, a man or a woman desires healing through a declaration by a Church tribunal (a Catholic Church court), which does not deny that a relationship existed, but simply states that the relationship was missing something that the Church requires for a valid marriage, falling short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. (Commonly called an 'annulment.') Advocates are available for those needing assistance with declarations of nullity. Call the parish office to set up an appointment.
