

Attention, seniors! Please pick up your 2026 application packet for the Ladies Sodality Scholarship, recognizing a student who exemplifies the values and beliefs of the Catholic faith. Packets are available this week in the Parish office and are due on April 30, 2026.

REISKE COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP

Applications will be available at the Parish Office this week. Any college bound parishioner is eligible who:

- Graduated from St. Elizabeth School
- Presently is a member of St. Elizabeth Parish
- Is active in the Parish
- Attends Mass EVERY WEEKEND
- Has financial need

Applications are due by Tuesday, March 31, 2026, no later than 4:00 pm. Fr. Alfred and the Selection Committee will then review the applications and present their selection to the Pastoral Council. First time applicants will have preferential consideration and no one applicant will be awarded the scholarship more than two times.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Thank you to all who have pledged or contributed to our Capital Campaign. While we continue to look at new fundraisers where the community can participate, ultimately this is our church, our school and our campus. We need YOU praying for our success, talking up the needs of our parish, and pledging and giving, maybe even beyond your comfort level. If you do not currently tithe 10% of your gross income, this would be an excellent opportunity to ease into it through monthly payments.

Thus far, we are happy to report that we have received a total of \$300,051.00 pledged and collected \$183,300.00 in actual donations. We have a long way to go, but we are confident in our parish!

There is an assessment amount that we are required to pass along to the diocese. These funds will help to maintain and improve exterior conditions at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception as well as maintenance needs at the Catholic Pastoral Center and Villa Maria Conference Center in Springfield. Our assessment amount for this campaign is \$75,456. This amount will take care of our responsibility and is a ONE TIME payment to the diocese.



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Soon our diocese will take up The Catholic Relief Services Collection. Your support for this collection provides aid to vulnerable people affected by war, natural disasters, and exploitation.

Human trafficking is the exploitation of a person through forced labor, domestic servitude, or commercial sex. It affects women, children, and men of all ages everywhere in the world, including in the United States. Although some victims of human trafficking are also smuggled across national borders, human trafficking involves anyone who is compelled by force, fraud, or coercion to provide work or service, regardless of nationality or citizenship or geographic location.

Poverty, isolation from the support of family and friends, and cultural or language barriers are among the factors that place people at risk of trafficking. Native Americans are particularly vulnerable to trafficking and violence, as many live in poverty away from reservations or tribal lands. Meanwhile, many reservations cover vast rural territories and have few law enforcement resources to aid victims of trafficking and bring perpetrators to justice.

In light of these challenges, successful antitrafficking efforts must involve communities that can recognize the signs of trafficking and provide direct assistance to victims. School teachers, parish staff and clergy, and health care providers at community clinics – with training to recognize the signs of human trafficking in their own communities – can be effective in combatting the exploitation of those they serve.

With funds received through The Catholic Relief Services Collection, the office of Migration and Refugee Services (MRS) of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops launched a pilot program to combat human trafficking among indigenous Hawaiians in the Diocese of Honolulu and on the St. Regis Mohawk Reservation in the Diocese of Ogdensburg, New York. Working with local partners, MRS staff assessed the challenges facing those communities, trained local leaders to recognize the signs of human trafficking, and helped leaders establish networks to respond to the needs of victims.



Queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo,

Pronto nuestra diócesis realizará The Catholic Relief Services Collection. El apoyo de ustedes a esta colecta les proporciona ayuda a las personas vulnerables afectadas por guerras, desastres naturales y explotación.

La trata de personas es la explotación de una persona mediante el trabajo forzado, la servidumbre doméstica o el sexo comercial. Esto afecta a mujeres, niños y hombres de cualquier edad, en cualquier parte del mundo, incluyendo a los Estados Unidos. Aunque algunas de las víctimas de la trata de personas también son objeto de tráfico a través de las fronteras nacionales, la trata de personas implica a cualquier persona que se vea obligada por fuerza, fraude o coerción para realizar un trabajo de servicio, independientemente de nacionalidad, ciudadanía o ubicación geográfica.

La pobreza, el estar alejados del apoyo de sus familiares y amigos, así como las barreras culturales o de lenguaje, son los factores principales que colocan a estas personas en riesgo de ser víctimas del tráfico humano. Los nativo-americanos son especialmente vulnerables a la trata de personas y a la violencia ya que muchos de ellos viven en la pobreza, lejos de sus reservas o tierras tribales. Por otra parte, muchas reservas cubren vastos territorios rurales y tienen muy pocos recursos para el cumplimiento de la ley con el fin de ayudar a las víctimas de la trata de personas y llevar a los responsables ante la justicia.

A la luz de estos desafíos, para que los esfuerzos contra la trata de personas sean exitosos deben involucrar a las comunidades que puedan reconocer las señales de la trata de personas y puedan proporcionar ayuda a las víctimas. Los maestros de las escuelas, el personal y el clero de la parroquia y los proveedores de servicios médicos de las clínicas comunitarias – con una capacitación para reconocer las señales de la trata de personas en sus propias comunidades – pueden ser muy eficaces para combatir la explotación de aquellos a quienes sirven.

Con los fondos recibidos de The Catholic Relief Services Collection, la oficina de Migration and Refugee Services (MRS) de la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de los Estados Unidos, inició un programa para combatir la trata de personas entre los nativos hawaianos en la Diócesis de Honolulu y en la Reserva Mohawk St. Regis en la Diócesis de Ogdensburg, Nueva York. El personal de MRS, trabajando con sus asociados locales, evaluaron los desafíos que enfrentaban estas comunidades, capacitaron a los líderes locales para que puedan reconocer las señales de la trata de personas y ayudaron a los líderes a establecer redes para responder a las necesidades de las víctimas.

El apoyo de ustedes a The Catholic Relief Services Collection empodera y brinda sanación a las comunidades afectadas por la pobreza y la injusticia. Su participación ayuda a MRS y a otros cinco ministerios católicos a revelar el amor de Cristo a las víctimas de la trata de personas, guerras y desastres naturales, tanto aquí en los Estados Unidos como alrededor del mundo.
